A few weeks ago, I answered a call to action from Kristy Coie-Day, the Director of the *Center for Development and Community Engagement* (formerly known as VA *Voluntary Service*) at McGuire VA Medical Center, asking for volunteers to assist with an event on-boarding new hires at the facility. I responded "yes" to the morning shift and our Department President Pamela Elam-Lipscombe agreed to relieve me for the afternoon shift.

Because of our responding to assist at that event, we learned of another opportunity that was to occur a few days later. We were invited to attend a *TEDx* recording of some amazing individuals at the Veterans Administration Offices in Washington, D.C. If you are not familiar with TED talks, they are basically videos that deliver a talk in 18 minutes or less and never from a lectern, showcasing an innovative idea or an inspiring message. The acronym stands for Technology, Entertainment and Design – three broad areas that shape our world.

President Pamela and I had the opportunity of not only witnessing the recordings of several noteworthy individuals who shared their messages, but also to interact and make connections with them. Among them were Eileen Vélez-Vega, the

Secretary of Transportation and Public Works of Puerto Rico who shared her experiences as a civil engineer - a male dominated profession - emphasizing that "Girls can do anything"; Ms. Kalautie JangDhari, the Executive Director/CEO of the VA Hospital in Miami, who shared her message of never letting anyone tell you who you are or who you can be; Dr. John Looft, Director of the Motion Analysis Laboratory at the VA Hospital in Minneapolis who works

who works with amputees in a pilot program that provides real-time digital feedback to patients and providers allowing more rapid adaptation to prostheses; and Walt Dannenberg, from the VA Healthcare System in Long Beach, who related his experiences growing up with a mother whose job was to meet helicopters returning servicemember's remains to San Diego from Vietnam, and how that shaped his career in leadership with the VA. These connections and conversations are proving invaluable to us in helping to enhance the vision of service for the ALA Department of Virginia. That in turn led to additional opportunities which will be shared in another newsletter.

President Pamela and I would never had the opportunity to meet these individuals had we not responded to a simple call for volunteers for a few hours on a Saturday. How you can help 'Be The One'

The American Legion recently launched its Be The One campaign to encourage American Legion Family members, veterans, servicemembers and others to take action when they believe a veteran is at risk of suicide.

The American Legion, the nation's largest veterans service organization with more than 1.8 million members, is guided by its Four Pillars. Among those is the Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation pillar. At its core, the Legion's mission is to enhance the well-being of America's veterans, their families, our military and our communities by their devotion to mutual helpfulness.

Today, the No. 1 issue facing those who served is veteran suicide, according to the National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report. Each day, no fewer than 17 veterans die by suicide. That's more than 6,000 each year. The rate of suicide for veterans is more than 50% higher than that of nonveteran adults. As the Global War on Terrorism continues, there will be more veterans facing mental health issues such as post-traumatic stress disorder.
